Staying safe and happy online

We have recently been made aware of several concerns, which have been reported to us by children and parents, around content that children are being exposed to online, as well as how they are interacting online with each other, as well as strangers, whilst outside of school. Some parents have also raised that their children are receiving messages very late at night/in the early hours from their school peers via chat groups.

Whilst this has mainly been within Year 5 and Year 6, helping to keep our children safe and happy in a technological world is an ever-changing challenge for all parents and carers.

In school, online safety is an important part of our curriculum and we talk to the children in an ageappropriate way about how to use the internet safely, as well as what to do it they are worried.

We would urge you to talk to your children about how to stay safe as well as how to conduct themselves online and be aware of the parental controls that are available, if appropriate, on the devices your child is using. It is difficult sometimes to stay abreast of the latest apps and online sites but the links below provide information to help you understand how some of these work, and the potential dangers and difficulties that they present.

The PEGI rating and age limits on individual games and apps reflect not only the content but also the availability (or lack) of controls, restrictions and privacy within them; hence why whatsapp may seem surprising to be a 16 age limit.

Whilst you will need to exercise your own opinion on what you allow or don't allow your child to access online, experts recommend that you keep an open conversation about their online activity and talk to them about how to act online both to be kind and safe.

As and when older children have more unsupervised access through smart phones and tablets it is important to consider how to monitor this and support them as they further explore the online world. Remember also that as with everything, whatever you might be told, it will not always be only your child who is "the only one who isn't allowed"!






WORLD BOOK DAY

On Thursday 2nd March, the whole school celebrated World Book Day. Children were invited to dress up as their favourite book character and they enjoyed taking part in lots of book-based activities.


Nursery enjoyed sharing 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt', making story boards and Story maps, as well as their own books, and re-enacting the story through role play.






In Year 1, the children wrote about their favourite book character, tested out their illustration skills and paired with Year 3 to read together. They also took part in a book character 'I Spy' and enjoyed reading their class book, 'The Enormous Crocodile'.

In Year 2, the children read their class book, 'The Indoor Pirates on Treasure Island' and created and followed treasure maps. They also wrote a postcard home to Aunt Lucy from Paddington Bear's point of view and completed activities based on 'The Mega Magic Hair Swap' and 'The Day the Crayons Quit'.






Year 3 pupils enjoyed a visit to Waterstones Bookstore in Lakeside and experienced the pleasure of being surrounded by books for the whole morning. Children listened to an extract from the Waterstones Children's Book of the Month, 'Moonflight' by Gill Lewis, which is set in Tilbury Docks! They followed the adventures of Tilbury, part of the Docklands Rats, as he tries to break a curse to save all of ratkind. After that discussion, children had the opportunity to browse the bookstore, get comfortable and read any book of their choice, as well as design a book cover for a pre-existing book, or a cover for a book they would like to read. When they returned to school, they engaged in an afternoon of activities with Year 1 pupils!



Year 4 created their own comic strip based on the tall tales that Bradley Chalkers (in 'There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom') tells.

Year 5 enjoyed reading chapters from their class book, 'The Silver Sword', learning about ways people became self-sufficient during WW2, 'digging for victory' and rationing food. They then designed their own posters encouraging people to grow their own produce and planted a variety of seeds, which they will harvest (once fully grown) and create war-time snacks with. They ended the day with a trip to Waterstones! Year 6 designed a new front cover for their class book, filled with action, adrenaline and adventure: Stormbreaker (Alex Rider).





All the children and staff had a thoroughly enjoyable day, immersing themselves in an array of wonderful literature, as well as taking part in lots of book-based activities.




News from The Resource Base for Deaf Children

Year 2!




Our new Maths topic for the term focuses on different types of measurement! The children have enjoyed learning about centimetres, metres, grams and kilograms so far!


The children have used practical equipment to help consolidate their learning and begin to understand terms such as heavier, lighter and equal when considering mass and weight. Year 2 have enjoyed learning about these subjects and relating their learning to real life scenarios such as measuring ingredients when baking or measuring a desk to fit in their rooms!

They have also worked very hard to understand how measurements link to one another .e.g. there are 100cm in 1m or there are 1000g in 1kg. They have used this knowledge to further understand that 5m is equal to 500cm and so on.

The children have really impressed us with their approach and enthusiasm for their new subject and are looking forward to focusing on capacity next week!

















YEAR THREE Mrs Smith and Miss Fraser

















Investigation Question







YEAR FIVE Miss Lewis and Mrs Redmond















