This week, we had a special guest visit our school. Pete Faulding, a renowned world leading confined space and forensic search speacialist, arrived in a helicopter to talk to our children about the importance of water safety.

During the assembly, Pete shared some valuable tips on how to stay safe while enjoying water activities. He emphasized the significance of wearing life jackets and buoyancy aids and educated children on the signs that they may see around water, what they mean, and what to do in an emergency. We are thrilled to inform you that Pete donated four buoyancy aids and four life jackets of different sizes, which parents can loan for their children's safety on water trips. Pete privately funds the delivery of these assemblies and donates equipment across the country in support of the Lucas Dobson Water Safety Campaign. Children have missed so much time at school over the last few years and this has had a great impact on many. The Osborne Trust and our school take attendance and punctuality seriously. It is a key life lesson and helps our pupils to thrive giving them maximum choices at the end of their education journey; it is also proven to support children with their wellbeing.

You will see highlighted above the Department for Education guidelines on attendance and how a couple of day's absence can quickly impact a pupil's attendance.

Of course, it is understood that at times children are unwell and unable to attend school, please ensure you are familiar with the attendance policy and that you contact the school daily and in line with school procedures to update us on your child's illness.

Any absence of 5 days or more will require medical evidence; this can be of a prescription, photograph of named and dated prescribed medication or an appointment card.

It is a safeguarding requirement that you call into school on a daily basis to advise if your child is unwell, should we not hear from you our policy states we may complete a school welfare check and visit you at home to check on you and your family's welfare.

Where possible, please try to make pupils routine appointments for the dentist or medical appointments outside of school hours and please ensure you provide evidence of each appointment.

Holidays are only authorised in term time for exceptional circumstances this is at the discretion of the Head Teacher, should a holiday be unauthorised you may incur a penalty of £60 per child, per adult: this penalty is issued via the local authority. Please ensure you complete a holiday form, which is be available at the school office.

Finally, you can see highlighted in the table above the effect being late has on pupils, it can often cause added anxiety in addition to the lost learning time. Teacher input at the beginning of the class is vital to ensure pupils get the maximum out of each lesson and if pupils miss this, they can often feel it is difficult to catch up.

Of course, it is parental responsibility to ensure their child attends school and on time, however, should you feel you need support with attendance or have a reason that you find it difficult for your child to attend or arrive to school on time, please do not hesitate to contact me so we can arrange a meeting.

Warren Allotment Update!



News From The Resource Base for Deaf Children

Role models in the Deaf community aren't just important for other Deaf people; it's a key factor for our society to become more inclusive and to bridge the gaps in communication between Deaf and hearing people.

With celebrities like Lauren Ridloff, Alaqua Cox and Rose Ayling-Ellis leading the way to a better representation of Deaf people in the media, this in turn encourages Deaf and hearing people, both young and old, to change the way they see Deaf people and to actively become better when communicating and breaking down misconceptions and prejudices.

As part of Deaf Awareness Week Warren primary school were fortunate to have a deaf role model to visit. This special guest was born profoundly deaf. Camille Piper wanted to inspire deaf children as a positive role model sharing all her successes and achievements. She talked about graduating twice, volunteering for many deaf events/charity, setting up an Art Wellbeing group with an Art facilitator and much more.

Many questions were asked, mostly from hearing children, which showed how much they wanted to learn and understand the life of a deaf person.

During her time within the Resource Base there were open conversations about what it is like being deaf, the barriers that the children faced, such as being the only deaf child in the school. This also highlighted the importance of having events for the deaf children organised by the Essex Deaf Children's Society (EDCS) and Families of Deaf children (FDC).
















Hedgehogs and Rabbits Mrs Rose and Miss Tapson














Investigation Question –


















Investigation question:

YEAR FIVE Miss Lewis and Mrs Redmond



The year group have already enjoyed retelling the myth of Arinta (the story within the story) demonstrating their Year 5 writing skills. They have become much more confident using relative clauses, fronted adverbials and a wide range of punctuation. 












INVESTIGATION QUESTION: How is the armour used in Ancient Greek warfare different from what the Vikings wore?
